

















Case Study: Introductory Biology Courses

- During the first summer session of 2018, a free textbook from the OpenStax platform/repository was used in a Bio 1111 section with 30 students, replacing a \$90 textbook. A copy of the OpenStax textbook was made available via Blackboard, and a print copy was made available on Reserve at the library. **Students in that class saved \$2700**.
- In fall of 2018, the same textbook was used in Bio 1111 (two sections), Bio 1113, and Bio 1115. **Students in these classes saved a total of \$37,000**.
- Feedback from students: Students in each course this fall were surveyed to gather feedback on the textbook. Big takeaway: students find that free/open textbooks are either higher in quality or the same in quality as for-purchase textbooks. Another takeaway is that providing access to a textbook online helped students feel better-prepared for class.





Continuing Evolution of Snell Library


Library Entries



Room Utilization

- In 2018, we surpassed 100,000 hours of use for both group and individual study rooms for the first time:
 - Group rooms were booked approx. 102,000 hours.
 - Individual Rooms were booked approx. 105,000 hours.
- Snapshot: In October 2018, in the 16 hours from 8am to midnight:
 - The most booked room was CoLab F (1st floor). It was booked 99% of the time.
 - The least booked room was DMC 4 (2nd floor). It was booked 78% of the time.
- Most collaborative spaces are now fully booked a week or more in advance.










Workshops in the Library, 2017 (blue) vs. 2018 (orange)




Growth in course-based workshops: FY19 compared to previous years
